The reason this book was selected for a literary review project of historical fiction is because it is an excellent source to examine the southern culture, which created the need for an underground railroad. This novel written by Harriet Beecher Stowe (author of Uncle Tom's Cabin) is considered by critics to be her best work, was inspired by Buxton and Rev. King. You will have an opportunity to explore the conditions refugees were leaving when they settled in Canada. As well, you may better appreciate the significance of the Elgin Settlement in Canadian and world history. Consider what changes were made since this novel was written in 1856.

Literary Character Study

You have an opportunity to become acquainted with a major character from the novel, <u>DRED: A Tale Of The Great Dismal Swamp</u>. Excerpts were selected to illustrate a variety of issues encountered by people in bondage through the institution of slavery as existed in the United States.
